I miss my daughter Lorry Ann. When Lorry Ann was a child, her friends would come over to our house to play with her, because they loved her and the fact that my kitchen was decorated as a candy kitchen. I liked hearing her voice and the voices of other children who were playing in our house and running in and out to play games.

As my daughter grew older, she couldn't wait to turn eighteen and get a job. In fact, at the age 21, she was working three jobs, because she wanted to be selfsufficient and succeed.

I was so proud of her, that she could do so much and that she took pride in her work. She could paint, she could lay a tile floor, she was very well organized, and she loved to laugh.

She was very responsible. If she needed a few dollars from her dad, she always insisted on paying him back.

She loved life, and she loved her family. When I learned that she was missing, I knew something was wrong, because she always told me where she was, and she contacted me many times every day.

We looked for her every day while she was missing. We never missed a day until the last day. It was on that day that her body was found.

I attended the trial even though it was so painful to hear what Thomas Kokoraleis had done to my daughter. I cried so much that it was difficult for me to testify, but I did. I felt that there was some justice when Kokoraleis was sent to prison for seventy years. I thought that he would die in prison, but now I know that he is scheduled to be released from prison on September 29, 2017.

I don't want him out, because I am afraid that he may hurt someone else, and I don't want anyone else to go through what my poor daughter Lorry Ann endured.

I am praying that he does not get released.

Please God. I do not want anyone else's daughter to suffer like my daughter did.
